George William was born in 1914 the son of Harold and Edith nee Dunnett who had married at St. Andrews Church, Purlwell, on 3 August 1912. Jack was born in 1916.

George attended Batley Parish School and was a weft carrier at Messrs. G. & J. Stubleys, Bottoms Mills, where his father and grandfather were also employed. His mother died in March 1941. In 1934 he married Alice Allsopp who came from Fairburn. George William and

George William was one of the first to join up in 1939.

The Guards Armoured Division was an armoured division of the British Army during the Second World War. The division was created in the United Kingdom on 17 June 1941

during World War 2 from elements of the Guards units, the Grenadier Guards, Coldstream Guards, Scots Guards, Irish Guards, Welsh Guards, and the Household Cavalry.

The division remained in the United Kingdom, training, until 13 June 1944, when it landed several armoured command vehicles at Arromanche. It lagered its advanced tactical headquarters in communication with GHQ awaiting the bulk of the armour in Normandy, France, during Operation Overload as part of V111 Corps. Its first major engagement was Operation Goodwood, the attack by three armoured divisions towards Bourguebus Ridge in an attempt to break out of the Normandy beachhead. That was followed by Operation Bluecoat, the advance east of Caen as the Falaise pocket formed.

George William was killed in Action on 11 August 1944 and was buried at St Charles de Percy War Cemetery which is the

Corpl. George William Reynard (30), who lived with his grandfather, Mr. George Dunnett, of No. 1, Yard 5, Wellington Street, Batley, is reported killed on August 11th in North-West Europe, His wife, a Fairburn woman, received two field cards from France, the second of which said that he was "in the thick of it." There are four children, the eldest aged eight years and the youngest four months.

The elder son of Mr. H. Reynard, of Suffolk Street, and the late Mrs. Reynard, Corpl. Reynard was among the first to join up in this war. He was a former pupil of Batley Parish Church School and was a weft carrier at Messrs. G. and J. Stubleys Bottoms Mills, where his father and grandfather are still employed.

Mrs. Reynard has received a letter of sympathy from her husband's commanding officer.
